Learning targets:

Speaking and Listening: This activity provides students with a visual representation of how the New Year is celebrated in Spain, and students will use this input as they engage with classmates to discuss cultural differences between Spain and individual students in class.

Comprehension and Collaboration:

- Prepare for and participate effectively in a range of conversations and collaborations with diverse partners, building on others' ideas and expressing their own clearly and persuasively.
- Integrate and evaluate information presented in diverse media and formats, including visually, quantitatively, and orally.

Presentation of Knowledge and Ideas:

 Present information, findings, and supporting evidence such that listeners can follow the line of reasoning and the organization, development, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.

Writing: As a follow-up activity, after exploring how the New Year is celebrated in Spain, have students write a comparative essay to analyze similarities and differences between the Spanish tradition, their classmates' traditions and their own traditions.

• Text Types and Purposes:

- Write arguments to support claims in an analysis of substantive topics or texts, using valid reasoning, and relevant and sufficient evidence.
- Write informative/ explanatory texts to examine and convey complex ideas and information clearly and accurately through effective selection, organization, and analysis of content.

Production and Distribution of Writing:

 Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose and audience.
